Supportive Living, Long Term Care Spaces Approved

On March 7, 2019, Minister of Energy and MLA for Dunvegan-Central Peace, Marg McCuaig-Boyd announced the approval, by the provincial government, of up to \$24 million for a Supportive Living and Long-Term Care Facility in Spirit River. The project is planned to include 52 supportive living and 40 new and renovated lodge spaces in Spirit River.

“The seniors built this community and deserve to retire and age in their community,” said McCuaig-Boyd.

Saddle Hills County has committed \$1 million to the facility. Birch Hills County has committed \$250,000. The MD of Spirit River No. 133 has secured land east of the current lodge where the facility is expected to be built.

Reeve Alvin Hubert thanked the members of the Board of the Grande Spirit Foundation, the public non-profit organization representing 12 municipalities in the Grande Prairie area committed to providing senior citizens, low income families and individuals with appropriate and efficient

housing and support services. A needs assessment by the G5 municipalities concluded more lodge spaces and supportive living spaces were required in the region. Grande Spirit Foundation deemed the building of this supportive living project to be one of its highest priorities.

This project represents the first time that Alberta Health Services and Grande Spirit Foundation will have partnered to provide supportive living and long-term care in one facility.

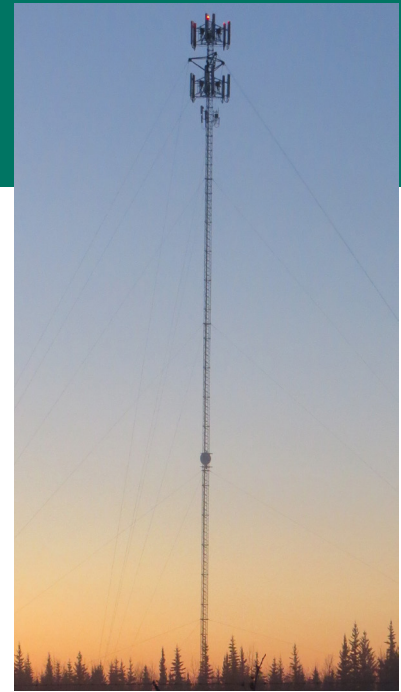
As of February, cellular mobility services have improved within the Fourth Creek and Ksituan areas of Saddle Hills County, thanks to additional equipment being installed on County towers.

The County continues to partner with TELUS to improve cellular mobility services for County residents and businesses by contributing towards the capital costs of equipment and/or towers

in the form of grants. In 2017, the Silver Valley TELUS Tower was installed, and, as of last month, TELUS activated their equipment on two County-owned towers, i.e. Fourth Creek & Ksituan.

More to come in 2019!

This year Saddle Hills County is once again partnering with TELUS on three more projects. They will consist of two new TELUS towers – one in the Bay Tree area and the



other near Blueberry Mountain. The third project consists of additional mobility equipment being installed on the County's Sneddon Creek tower, located in the Cotillion area.

Saddle Hills County's total contribution towards these partnerships will reach \$5.7M.

2019 Road Program

Another busy year is planned taking care of County roads and infrastructure.

Re-gravelling

The Operations Department has developed preliminary plans to complete 620 kilometers of road re-graveling in 2019. This compares with 672 kilometers of re-gravelling accomplished in 2018.

Dust Control

The County plans to complete a similar dust control program to the 2018 program which saw 119 residential sites and 69 kilometers of road receive dust control application (50 km of calcium and 9 km of non-corrosive dust control).

Road Rehabilitation

This year's preliminary plan for road rehabilitation includes 39 kilometers of road re-shaping and 16 kilometers of drainage improvement (ditch cleaning). The County plans for 60 roadway culvert replacements, 18 access approach upgrades and several new access approaches.

Road Projects & Culvert Replacements

The County has an ambitious plan in 2019 for specific road projects and bridge culvert replacement which includes:

Large Culvert Replacements:

- Rge. Rd. 72 – 2 kilometers north of Twp. Rd. 802
- Rge. Rd. 73 – 0.3 kilometers north of Twp. Rd. 800
- Rge. Rd. 80 – 0.8 kilometers north of Twp. Rd. 800
- Rge. Rd. 72 – 0.5 kilometers north of Hwy 49
- Rge. Rd. 104 – 2 kilometers south of Hwy 49

Roads:

- Rge. Rd. 131 – Henderson Creek Slide. Repair and road re-alignment
- Rge. Rd. 134 (South of Hwy 49) – 5.6 kilometers of gravel road upgrading
- Rge. Rd. 72 – 4.8 kilometers of gravel road upgrading from Northmark Road (Twp. Rd. 762) north
- Twp. Rd. 822 – Road re-alignment east of Rge. Rd. 71
- Rge. Rd. 72 - Slide repair 1 kilometer south of Twp. Rd. 774
- Twp. Rd. 824 – Construction of 1.6 kilometers of road east of Rge. Rd. 100
- Rge. Rd. 102 – Paving of 1.6 kilometers south of Hwy 49
- Twp. Rd. 811 & Hwy 725 – Construction of turning lane

New Hired Equipment Policy

Saddle Hills County has altered its Hired Equipment Policy and met with contractors in March to go over the details.

Starting this year, registered contractors will no longer be required to bid each year on County work. Instead, Council will set the gravel haul rate and loading factor. Also, equipment hired by the hour will be compensated according to Alberta Road Builders and Heavy Equipment Association rates.

Water

Bonanza– Bay Tree Water Line

In 2018 Saddle Hills County installed 15 kms of 150 mm diameter main water line from Bonanza to Bay Tree. In 2019 the County will be installing service lines to homes whose owners have signed water service agreements within the main line corridor. Council has also approved extending the service line south of Highway #49 in Bay Tree to service additional residents in that area.

Savanna Water Treatment Plant

Saddle Hills County began construction, in the fall of 2018, of a raw water reservoir at the Savanna Water Treatment Plant site north of Highway #681. Construction will continue in 2019 with the completion of two surface water reservoirs and the start of the water treatment plant and truck fill station adjacent to the reservoirs. When complete, residents in the area will have access to a potable water truck fill station providing a more convenient source of drinking water.

Woking Water Plant Upgrade

The County will be upgrading the Woking Water Treatment Plant in 2019 including the construction of a new clear well which will increase the amount of potable water stored at the plant for distribution to residents in the Hamlet.

Upgrades will include:

- New distribution pumps
- An upgrade to 3-phase power
- Increased electrical efficiency
- Upgrade of raw water reservoir fill pipeline
- Upgrading of electrical control systems.

Council Decisions & Initiatives

December 2018 – March 2019

G5 Formalizes Health Center Agreement

The G5 municipalities signed an operating agreement with the Central Peace Medical Services Corp. to manage the Central Peace Health Center. The G5 municipalities are the shareholders of the corporation.

Christmas at the County Open House

For the first time, Saddle Hills County held a Christmas Open House on December 6, 2018. Council and staff were on hand to answer questions on issues of importance to the public.

County Proud Photo Contest Winners

The winners of the 2018 'County Proud' photo contest were announced at the 'Christmas at the County' open house. Entries from all participants were displayed and the winners in each category received framed copies of their photos.

Toboggan Hill and Winter Day Use Area Studied

The County is studying the possibility of using the large piles of earth from the excavation for the reservoirs for the new Savanna water treatment plant, for use as a toboggan hill and winter day use area once the project is complete.

Land Use Public Hearings Held On Cannabis Bylaw

In January of 2019, Council accepted a draft bylaw (327-2018) respecting the regulation of cannabis. Public Hearings were held throughout the community regarding land use issues surrounding cannabis. The last Public Hearing was held at the County Complex on March 26.

2019 – 2021 Strategic Plan Released

Council held a special Strategic Planning Session in January of 2019 to update its Strategic Plan to reflect changing circumstances, opportunities and challenges. The resulting document received final

approval on February 26, 2019 and was published and distributed to the public. (See page 10)

Council Changes Childcare Subsidy Program Eligibility

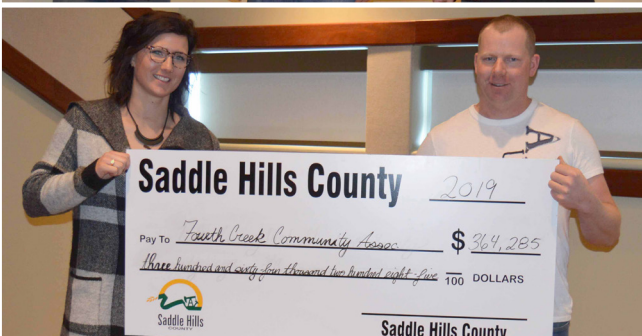

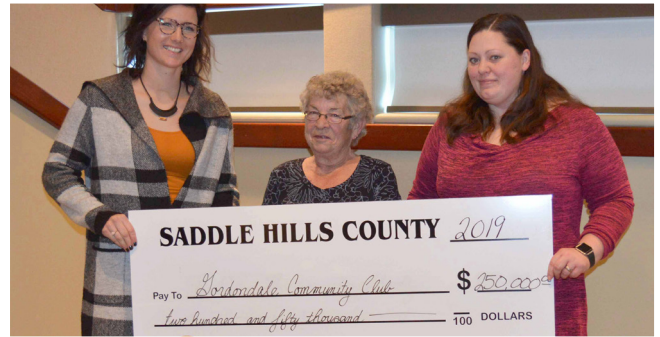

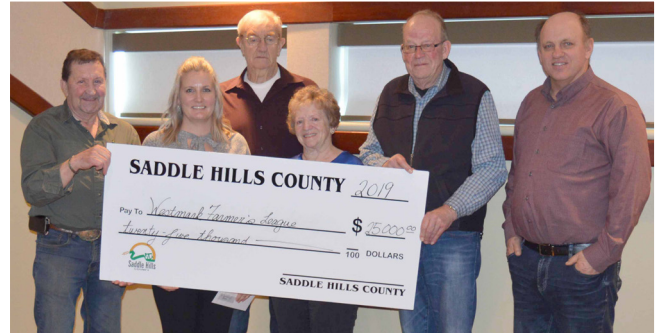

Economic Development

Business Visits

During the fall of 2018, the County's Economic Development Coordinator surveyed Saddle Hills County business owners to learn what could drive expansion and increase viability. Fifty businesses were visited. In a similar spirit, farmers and ranchers will be visited during the spring of 2019.

County Investigating the attraction of a Fertilizer Manufacturing Facility

Saddle Hills County is investigating the feasibility of a manufacturing facility to use locally-extracted natural gas to produce urea, a type of nitrogen fertilizer. In February 2019, Community and Regional Economic

Support (CARES) program awarded \$25,000 to Saddle Hills County for advancing the investigation of the Nitrogen Fertilizer Manufacture Feasibility Study. The County is currently circulating a request for proposal to start the investigation.

Small Business Saturdays

Business visits identified two needs: Time Management & Organization and Successful Hiring & Employee Retention. In response, Saddle Hills County offered workshops - Small Business Saturdays. Over successive weekends in January, the County offered free skills-training workshops for business in collaboration with Grande Prairie Regional College (GPRC). The workshops were well-attended and generated positive feedback.

Community Development

Home Support Services Program

The Home Support Services Program has been a major focus during the first quarter of 2019 with plans to promote and explain the program to residents continuing into the second quarter.

All Saddle Hills County residents are eligible for the County's Home Support Program. The program was designed for seniors, families and individuals. Anyone experiencing a disability, illness, injury, or grief may qualify. Those in need of pre or post-natal care, suffering from a communicable disease or awaiting placement or in need of respite may qualify.

Payment is calculated on a sliding scale according to income. Services can be provided weekly, bi-weekly or monthly and on a short term or long term basis. Services are only limited by the number of workers available. Residents can learn about the full range of services provided and/ or register on the County website or by calling 780-864-3760. Workers are

available to do household cleaning and chores Monday to Friday from 8:15 am – 4:30 pm.

Home Care Services provided by Saddle Hills County do not include bathing, caring, or providing medications. These services may be available to Saddle Hills County residents through Alberta Health Services. Please contact 1-855-371-4122.

International Women's Day

International Women's Day was held in Westmark on March 8, 2019 and the Honorable Marg McCuaig-Boyd was in attendance.

Presentations were made about ways in which women can take better care of themselves as they balance their lives, work and families.

This event is now held every year and plans are to move the event to all the other communities in Saddle Hills.

Agricultural Services Board

The first few months of 2019 have been an exciting and busy time for the Rural Development Department. In February, a Dugout Workshop was held for ratepayers and in early March a Producer Supper was held at the Savanna Rec-plex with a presentation on the Canadian Agricultural Partnership (CAP).

The Agricultural Service Board and Council sent five County women to the Advancing Women in Agriculture Conference in Calgary - Sarah Weiss, Wynter Weiss, April Thomi, Laura-Lee Wilms and Jaclyn Rogers. Adam and Terri Fitzpatrick attended the Canadian Young Farmers Forum in Toronto, Ontario in early April.

The 2019 BMO Farm Family Award is now open for nominations. If you know of a deserving farm family please inform an Agricultural Service Board Member, Councillor or the Agricultural Coordinator, Dessa Nicholson.

2018 Annual ASB Report Highlights

In November of 2018, three new public-at-large members were appointed to the Agricultural Service Board: Mallory Kaiser, Cheryl Brett and Tyson Hessler. Candace Dolen and Adam Fitzpatrick were appointed as Chair and Vice-Chair, respectively.



Council members are Ed Armagost (Ward 4) and Ken Titford (Ward 1).

All County rights-of-way were mowed by Cross Country Mowing out of La Crete and over 500 kilometers of the County rights-of-way were blanket sprayed to control weeds.

Five seasonal employees were appointed as Weed and Pest Inspectors, and throughout the Summer 1200+ weed inspections were completed within our borders. 82 of those inspections resulted in Weed Notices, compared to 42 notices in 2017. A large majority of weed notices were issued for Orange Hawkweed and Scentless Chamomile; due to the elevation of Scentless Chamomile to a prohibited noxious weed. Two notices issued were enforced in June of 2018.

The Orange Hawkweed infestation in the Fourth Creek area is an ongoing issue. Although Orange Hawkweed is a difficult weed to deal with, the stakeholders involved are focused on removing the infestation.

Saddle Hills County ASB Chair, Councillors and staff met with the Minister of Agriculture and Forestry at the Rural Municipalities of Alberta Conference in November to discuss issues facing County ratepayers such as: AFSC pea seeding deadline, elk damage on crops and timely response for Weed and Pest notice appeals from the Minister's office.

For 2019, the County has hired four weed and pest control inspectors. Council has also created a new Agricultural Foreman position to assist with delivery and management of County agricultural programs.

Fire Prevention

New Savanna Fire Hall Completed

Savanna Fire Hall Opened February 5th

More than 90 residents joined Saddle Hills County Council, dignitaries and staff to celebrate the Grand Opening of the new Savanna Fire Hall Tuesday evening, February 5, 2019.

Director of Community and Protective Services Brian Ballard welcomed residents and dignitaries which included: the Honourable Marg McCuaig-Boyd, Minister of Energy and MLA for the riding of Dunvegan-Central Peace Notley, Reeve Alvin Hubert, Deputy Reeve Kristen Smith, Councillor Ed Armagost, District Fire Chief Ken Dolen and members of Council. In his opening remarks, Reeve Alvin Hubert spoke of Council's appreciation for all of the hard work by staff, contractors and businesses which made the project such a success. He also thanked fire fighters and first responders for the crucial job they perform in keeping residents and businesses safe.

“Saddle Hills County believes it is our responsibility to ensure that

our fire fighters and first responders have the very best equipment, training and facilities we can provide for them,” he said. Reeve Hubert then introduced Marg McCuaig-Boyd who expressed her thanks to the fire fighters and first responders and congratulated Saddle Hills County for always thinking and planning globally and for the long term.

“I especially want to thank our fire fighters and first responders. You are taking really good care of us and it is great that you have such a beautiful building to help you do the work which is so important to us,” she told the audience, adding,

“We are safe when we know you're not far away.”

Chief Dolen thanked the County for the new hall and expressed particular appreciation for the work of Brian Ballard who, Dolen said, has always taken good care of Saddle Hills County fire fighters and made sure they have the best training and tools needed to do their jobs.

Dolen also thanked Fire Services and Facilities Maintenance Coordinator Ken Macfarlane for his work on behalf of the fire department.



Woking Fire Hall Tender Awarded

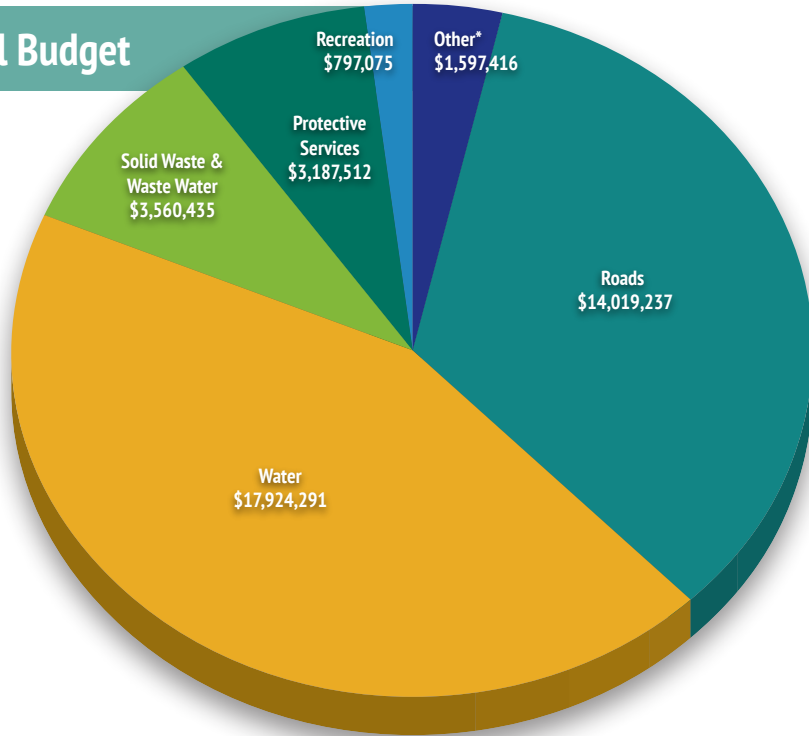
The tender for construction of the new Woking Fire Hall was issued at the end of January and closed on February 21st. The contract was awarded to Chandos Construction.

Architectural firm Turpin Kong is planning a building similar to the new Savanna Fire Hall. The land for the Fire Hall has been set aside and stripped of overburden just west of the Hamlet.

Construction is expected to begin in the spring of 2019 and the project is expected to be completed by the end of 2019.

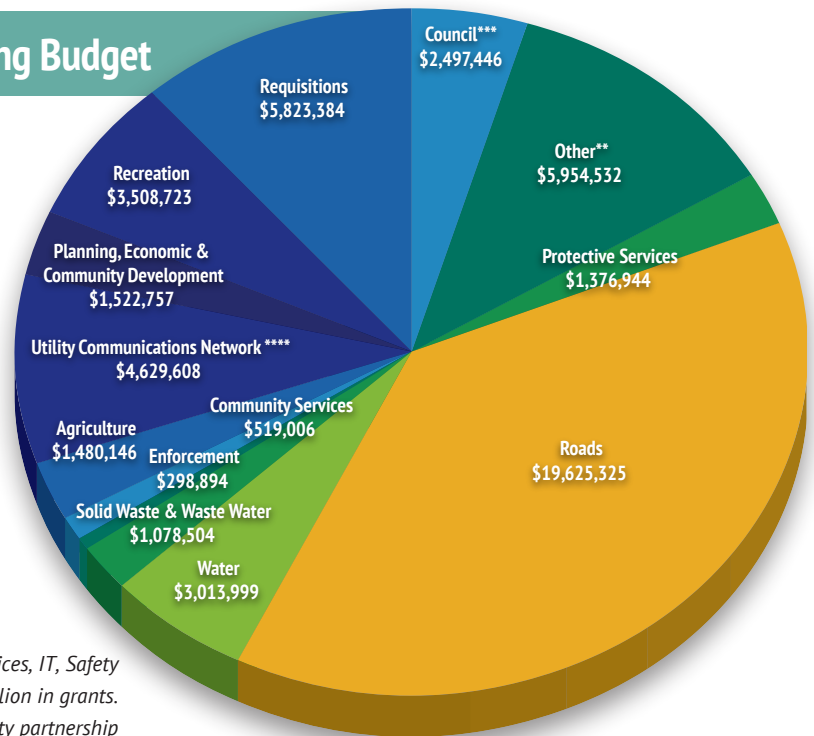


New Tax Installment Payment Plan

The County's new Tax Installment Payment Plan (TIPP) program makes budgeting easier and eliminates the risk of incurring one or more of the three 6% late payment penalties now in force throughout the year. Upon approval, tax payments are automatically withdrawn from the ratepayer's account on the first of each month.
